WHAT IS THE Council of Europe Commissioner for Human Rights at the Council of Europe?

The Council of Europe (CoE) <u>Commissioner</u> <u>for Human Rights</u> is an independent; and impartial; non-judicial institution and one of the most important posts within the CoE system. Its <u>mandate</u> revolves around the promotion of awareness of and respect for human rights in the 46 member states.

The Council of Europe Commissioner for Human Rights is elected by the Parliamentary Assembly for a term of office of six years from a list of three candidates drawn up by the Committee of Ministers. On 23 November 2023 the Ministers' Deputies decided via secret ballot on three candidates: Manfred Nowak, Meglena Kuneva and Michael O'Flaherty.

Now, it is up to the Assembly's plenary to elect one of the three candidates in its winter plenary session on 23 January 2024, in Strasbourg. The Assembly consists of 306 representatives from all member states. Eligible to vote in the election are those who physically attend the Session on 23 January.

WHAT IS AT STAKE with the next term of the Commissioner for Human Rights at the Council of Europe?

The next six years of the term of office of the CoE Commissioner for Human Rights are decisive: We are facing the most urgent global human rights problems and challenges due to the <u>triple planetary crisis</u> (climate change, nature and biodiversity loss, and pollution), wars in Europe and frozen conflicts that are at risk of escalating. At the same time, we have to think about a further development of Human Rights with regard to the fast new social developments (artificial intelligence) and to protect Human Rights of future generations (triple planetary crisis and youth).

There is a close nexus between Democracy and Human Rights. Liberal, pluralistic, Democracy is challenged by extremism and illiberal concepts. Therefore, the fight for and development of Human Rights is a service to our democracies.

The CoE has been a pioneer in the protection of human rights since its foundation – thus the CoE Commissioner for Human Rights must be at the forefront of making sure that the root causes of these challenges are addressed and the core values of a pluralist, liberal democracy, human rights and the rule of law are upheld.
